Summary

In the near future, Aaron Gray is an elementary school music teacher who dreams of joining the elite Circle of Reciprocitor players who perform at the prestigious Resonance Chamber. Homeless and destitute, Aaron continues playing his Reciprocator in subway stations. During another protest, he encounters a CLF member who recognizes his ability to block neural manipulation signals. She recruits him to join their resistance efforts.

Aaron begins working with the CLF, teaching others how to use basic Reciprocator skills to block government emotional manipulation systems.
